Faith In Us

It's been a long day of teaching and working the crowds. He tells the disciples to load up the boat and to get ready for a trip across the Galilean lake. And they all go aboard... taking Jesus along "just as he was." Nothing extraordinary in this: the experienced fishermen-disciples take up their stations at oar and sail; the exhausted rabbi rests his head on the pillow in the stern. He trusts his companions to do what they know how to do...steer their way safely across the waters to the country of the Gerasenes. (Check it out in Mark 4:35-41.)

So why, in the midst of a storm, do these experienced boaters cry out to Jesus? Have they never worked through the suddenness and violence of a wind-swept Galilee? Of course, they have. Does their new-found relationship to Jesus expunge from them every bit of knowledge they brought along from their previous careers? No. I struggle to find an adequate explanation for their behavior...including their willingness to indict their Teacher on the grounds that he simply does not care for them simply because he has taken a much needed nap. What's going on here?

Maybe this: We often think about faith from only a human perspective...asking questions of ourselves and others about whether or not we have faith in Jesus or faith in God or faith in God's plan for our lives. Sometimes we might even be so thoughtful as to wonder about whether or not we have the faith of Jesus...that daring, radical trust in God's favor and power.

But I wonder if this particular text isn't also (maybe even mostly) about glimpsing God's faith in us. These disciples, to whom Jesus has explained everything, are entrusted with their own roles to play in Christ's announcement and enactment of the coming Kingdom of God. Jesus himself apparently trusts them enough to let them do what they already know how to do...safely drive the boat...so that he can do what he needs to do. Unfortunately, they seem unwilling or unable.

Dear sisters and brothers: God has not created us without gifts and abilities. Holy Trinity is a community blessed with smart, faithful people and abundant resources. The reach of our ministry has actually grown over the last year...not in ways we expected, of course, but grown nonetheless. Yet sometimes we seem not to see that growth and those marvelous assets. Sometimes we hesitate to take up those gifts and abilities for the sake of the kingdom work entrusted to us. Why? Well...maybe we're worn out after more than a year of pandemic illness, isolation, and uncertainty. Maybe we are afraid of doing the wrong thing, and we don't want to get chastised for our mistakes. Maybe we just don't want the responsibility that comes with being a mission team and not a club or a consumer product or a pretty building. Whatever the reason, our faith seems at times to fail us...just like those first disciples.

But God does not fail us, and God's faith in us and love for us does not waver. I believe that God continues to trust that we can do what we have been gifted and sent to do.

Recognizing God's faith in us is especially important at this moment in time. We are beginning (at last!) to emerge from the pandemic, and we do so into a world that has changed. All the new things we've learned...all the new folks we've met...all the changes we've needed to make are now a part of what some folks refer to as the new

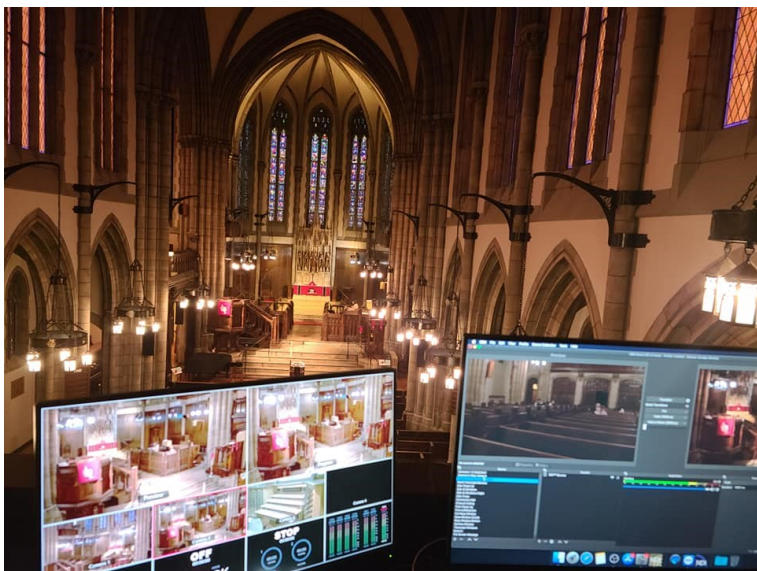

Renovated Space for Live Stream

There have been some changes made to the rear balcony in the Sanctuary. It now serves the new broadcast control booth. Thank you to Bruce Mansour and Gary Radanof for converting the space into a usable, functional area that has made running the stream easier. Those working in the control booth can now see what's happening on the Sanctuary floor much easier. A new digital sound mixer has been added to the control booth. This piece of equipment runs the audio for the live stream and allows for additional microphones and instruments to be connected down on the floor and fed into the audio broadcast. Two new microphones were also installed for the Choir stall area. †

BIG NEWS FOR LES DELICES!

Les Delices Founder and Artistic Director Debra Nagy has been nominated by the Association of Performing Arts Professionals (APAP) for the Award of Merit for Achievement in the Performing Arts for her visionary work this season with Les Délices through the Virtual Concert Series and SalonEra.

The awards ceremony will be held virtually on May 6th. †



Les Délices is pleased to announce a new, free community program called LD Music Meditations, launching this week in conjunction with National Poetry Month. LD Music Meditations combines poetry and music to bring soul-soothing and life-affirming art into people's day and can be accessed as a podcast (available on Apple, Google, or wherever you get your podcasts) and by telephone hotline at 216-859-5800.

For their first series of meditations, Les Délices invited legendary broadcaster Leon Bibb to lend his voice to the project. Each 3-6 minute episode in the series features classic or contemporary poetry by Northeast Ohio writers read by Bibb along with curated performances from Les Délices live-performance archives. Each episode concludes with prompts for mindfulness or guided listening.

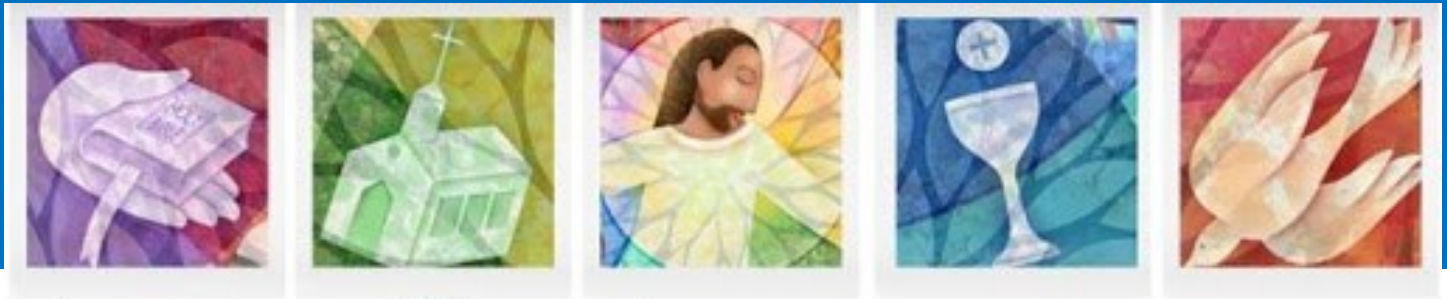


LD Artistic Director Debra Nagy explained the idea behind the project. "The past year of isolation, fear, stress, and loss have taken a serious emotional toll on virtually everyone. With Music Meditations, we wanted to create a safe space for respite or reflection and we wanted that art experience to be able to be freely and privately accessed with or without an internet connection."

Before the pandemic, Les Délices partnered with library branches, homeless shelters, and senior centers to bring their free programs into the community. But when live performances were forced to go on hiatus and many public spaces closed their doors, those with limited access to technology or high-speed internet were suddenly cut off from art experiences that moved online. Nagy continued, "Low or no-barrier art experiences are still tremendously important - perhaps now more than ever. We'll be working to spread the word about Music Meditations through food banks, shelters, and other means in communities that are underserved, where our program may be most impactful but where access to devices or internet connectivity may be limited."

Les Délices hopes to work with a variety of community partners – both to distribute and spread the word about the program as well as to curate the poetry. Poetry for the first eight episodes was selected with help from Diane Kendig, whose decades of teaching and writing includes numerous publications and a passion for working with prison inmates and asylum seekers. Noting that Northeast Ohio is home to a tremendously talented community of writers, Nagy said, "As the project continues, it would be great to work with other writers, readers, and librarians."

"In fact," added LD Executive Director Laura Wiegand, "the shifts in programming we have made this past year have opened new opportunities to collaborate across disciplines and strengthen our ties in Cleveland's cultural community. We're excited to continue this momentum with Meditations and other future projects." †



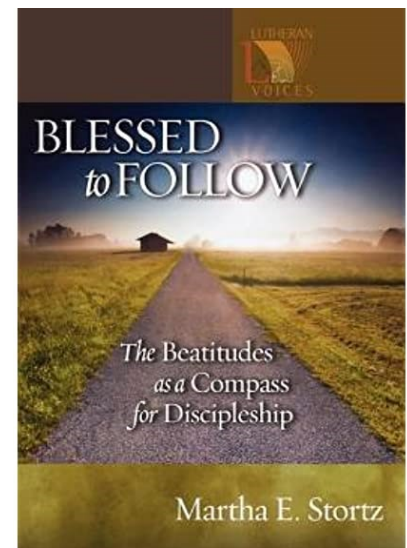

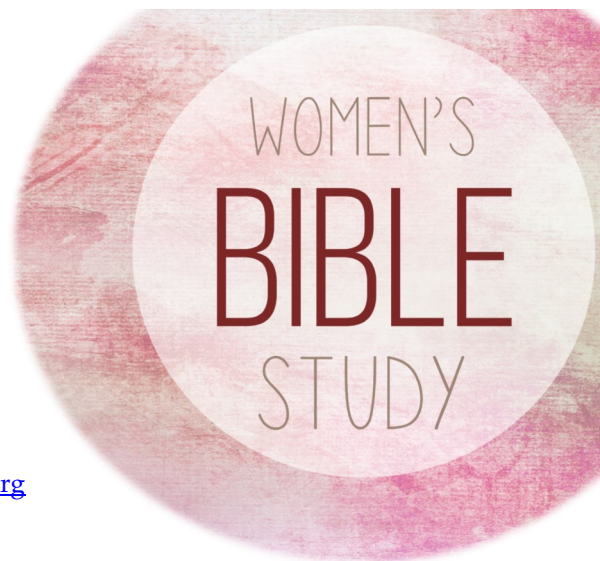

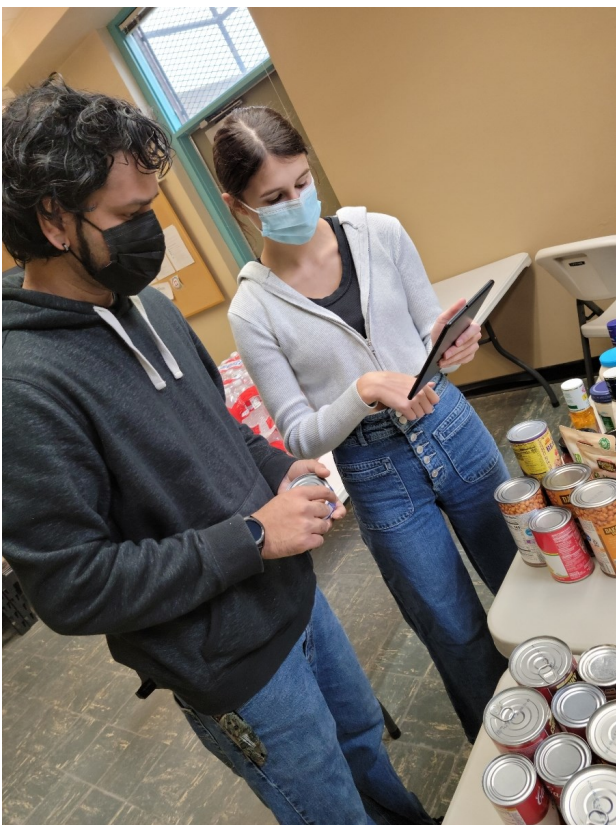

DLM Improves Technology to Help Streamline Process

If you've ever volunteered for DLM, you know firsthand the many facets to this mammoth food pantry ministry. Then you understand the need to add and improve technology in order to better streamline the entire process. Thanks to Stefan Katz, the new DLM Operations Manager, a new computerized inventory system has made tracking food inventory much easier and more efficient. Additionally, the creation of a new volunteer database is nearly complete, again thanks to Stefan. This will help improve collecting volunteer data and information for reporting purposes.

In addition to technology improvements, DLM has a new partnership with the Diaper Bank at Project MKC in Youngstown. On a regular basis, DLM will receive diapers (requested sizes) to include in the personal care boxes for families who are need of this item. †

One of Holy Trinity's Favorites!

A beloved hymn on Holy Trinity's Favorite Hymn List is used as a processional on Easter Day. "Jesus Christ Is Risen Today," first appeared in German and Bohemian manuscripts of the 14th century as a 5-stanza Easter carol. In 1749, *The Complete Psalmodist* only retained the first stanza and others were substituted making this virtual hymn recording. Charles Wesley had a hand in writing stanza 3. It is filled with joyous "Alleluias" (meaning "Praise the Lord").

Join in celebrating the seven weeks of Easter by listening to/ singing along with hundreds of musicians in this newly-created setting. ALCM thanks the 1,784 vocalists and instrumentalists who participated in making this virtual hymn. †

normal. And we need to be prepared to meet that new normal and to be church within that context. It's hard work.

But some things have not and will not change. We still have the good news of a Crucified and Risen Lord who demonstrates clearly that sin and death do not get the last word. We still rely on the unrelenting grace of God which reaches to us in the transformative love of God's Holy Spirit. And we still offer a vital and purposeful way of being in the world to a world which searches desperately for such hope.

Now is the time, dear friends, to grab hold of the oars...to take up the mission we have been given...to re-double our commitment to moving beyond the building and into the community by whatever means we have in order to invite, welcome, and connect our neighbors to Christ's saving work. We are at a moment of preparation for the next great era of what it means to be church.

Yes...the storm still rages. Yes...some days we will be afraid. But even stronger than the storms around us or the fear within us is the constancy of God's love for us and God's purpose for us to bear good news to the world. What a great time to be the Church! †

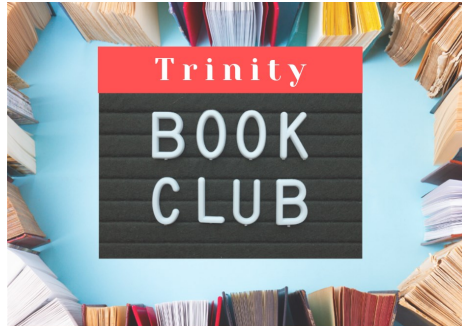

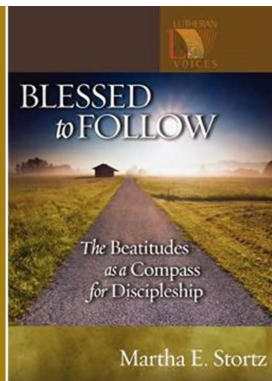
