The Season After Pentecost

"This is the day that the Lord has made; let us rejoice and be glad in it." – Psalm 118:24

The Season After Pentecost – which spans a bit of the spring, all of the summer, and most of the fall - is often referred to as “ordinary time.” While it is not lifted up like Advent, Christmas, Epiphany, Lent, and Easter, I don’t think there is anything ordinary about this season that accounts for almost half of the Christian year.

That is why I have chosen for us to use the words *“This is the day that the Lord has made. Let us rejoice and give thanks in it!”* in our worship these last several weeks and will use as we continue to move through this Season After Pentecost. I don’t want us to lose sight of how precious each and every day is!

Author and theologian, Frederick Buechner, emphasizes this in his book *Beyond Words*:

It is a moment of light surrounded on all sides by darkness and oblivion. In the entire history of the universe, let alone in your own history, there has never been another just like it and there will never be another just like it again. It is the point to which all your yesterdays have been leading since the hour of your birth. It is the point from which all your tomorrows will proceed until the hour of your death. If you were aware of how precious it is, you could hardly live through it. Unless you are aware of how precious it is, you can hardly be said to be living at all.

“This is the day which the Lord has made,” says Psalm 118. “Let us rejoice and be glad in it” (vs. 24). Or weep and be sad in it for that matter. The point is to see it for what it is, because it will be gone before you know it. If you waste it, it is your life and you’re wasting. If you look the other way, it may be the moment you’ve been waiting for always that you’re missing.

All other days have either disappeared into darkness and oblivion or not yet emerged from it. Today is the only day there is.

I hope you will make a habit of worshipping regularly this Season After Pentecost, in-person or on-line, as we celebrate the wonder and uniqueness of this far more than ordinary time of year! †



A Word About Online Holy Communion

We have been fortunate to offer online worship for persons who have not been able to join us for in-person worship at Holy Trinity. We want to be certain you can participate in Holy Communion when you worship at home as we are confident that Christ is present with you in a uniquely powerful way when you do.

The Spirit unites us with the Communion of Saints — those whose strong witness has shaped our ministry of love to each other and the communities we find ourselves in. Whether in the sanctuary or in your own home you receive, through this powerful meal, gifts of grace, forgiveness and eternal life from our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.

We hope you will be touched and blessed by preparing for and celebrating this meal. However, if you choose not to participate, we support you in your decision, too. While others are receiving the bread and wine, you may feel free to reflect on God's presence in your life and spend a few moments in prayer.

PREPARING FOR COMMUNION AT HOME. Create your own worship space, have bread and wine/grape juice available. Any bread/crackers can be used for the meal and any juice or wine is appropriate as well. Take the bread and wine in your hands when the Pastor begins to speak the words of institution ("On the night on which Jesus was betrayed...do this for the remembrance of me.") during the latter part of The Great Thanksgiving. You might want to pour a small portion into small glasses ahead of time for each person who will be worshipping with you.

CELEBRATING THE MEAL. Following the Lord's Prayer, the Pastor will address those worshipping at home saying "The body of Christ, broken for you. Take and eat. The blood of Christ poured out for you. Take and drink." At that time you are invited to share bread and wine. If there are others with you, you may gather in a circle and pass the bread from one person to another saying, "The body of Christ, given for you." And then the wine, saying, "The blood of Christ, shed for you."

AFTER WORSHIP. Traditionally, leftover communion elements — the bread and the wine (or juice) — are either eaten or returned to the earth. If you do not consume them, please take them outside and place them in your garden or on your lawn. It isn't appropriate to throw them in the trash or down the drain.

Whenever we worship – in person or online – we are the gathered people of God! Join us on Sundays at 9:30 a.m. as you are able. †

Jessica Tong, violinist & Michael Sheppard, pianist

Canadian violinist Jessica Tong has garnered international acclaim, having been a top prizewinner at the Eckhardt-Gramatté Competition, the Toronto Symphony, Canadian Music and Yellow Springs International Chamber Music Competitions. She has previously served as first violinist of both Vinca and Larchmere String Quartets, and is currently the Violin Professor at the State University of New York at Fredonia and Chamber Music Director of the Composers Conference at Brandeis University.

Pianist Michael Sheppard was the winner of the prestigious American Pianists Association Classical Fellow Award — a designation that led to the release of a critically acclaimed solo recording by Harmonia Mundi in 2007. He gives masterclasses, teaches regularly and plays with some of the top singers and instrumentalists around the US, working at both the Peabody Institute of Music and the Baltimore School for the Arts, sharing his love and understanding of music and the artistic process with future generations. Sheppard is also a conductor and burgeoning actor.

This program explores opposing pairs of French and German composers of the romantic 19th and early impressionistic 20th centuries.

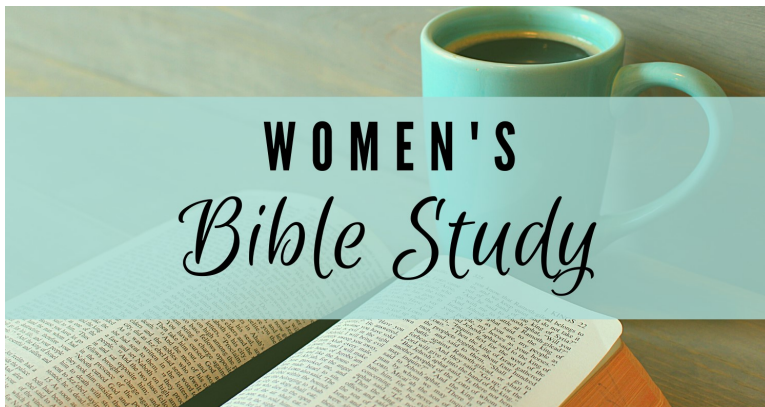

Faith Formation



Jesus and Nature: Teachers of Faith by the Rev. Sara Olson-Smith

Jesus often turned to the natural world in teaching, opening our eyes to see creation not just as something to be cared for, but as our teacher and kindred. It is no mistake that Jesus, who lovingly spoke of soil and plants, was thought to be a gardener that first Easter morning. This three-session Bible study will shift our perspectives and allow nature to be our teacher, through the words of Jesus and other parts of Scripture. The trees, the soil and the creatures will offer us new perspectives on the character of God and challenge us to deepen our stewardship of God's precious creation.

- **September 17, Session 1: "Trees,"** will tap into Biblical images of trees and explore why planting and protecting trees is important, while rooting us in models of interdependence and mutuality.
- **October 15, Session 2: "Soil,"** will dig deeply into the parable of the soil (otherwise known as the parable of the seed, Matthew 13) and other Biblical accounts that relate to care for this part of creation, while looking at models of growth that involve wholeness and wellness.
- **November 19, Session 3: "Creatures,"** offers us an opportunity to observe and learn about God from birds, foxes, sheep, dogs and other animals, while considering habitat protection, food justice and the model of trust.

We will gather at 9 a.m. , locations will vary each month. Breakfast will be served followed by our study. If you have any questions or need a copy of the study, call/text Rachel Núñez at (330) 634-6597. †

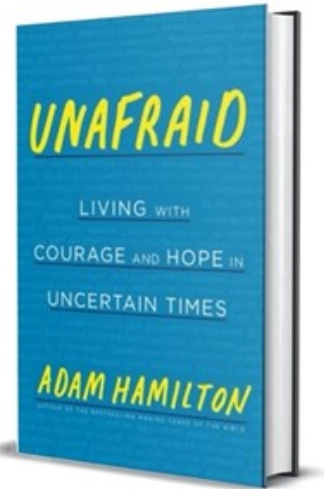

Unafraid Study/ Discussion Group

"You'd be hard-pressed to overstate the extent to which fear, anxiety, and worry permeate our lives today. Making matters worse, not a week goes by when some new threat or calamity isn't dominating the headlines. Why are there so many tragedies? What will happen next." (excerpt from book jacket)

Unafraid: Living with Courage and Hope in Uncertain Times by Adam Hamilton takes an up close look at the fears that many people of faith live with and shows how to understand, untangle, and counter those fears using spiritual practices.



Pastor Becki will facilitate a five-week study/discussion based on **Unafraid** on Wednesdays beginning September 28th. An in-person group will be held in the Chapel Lounge on Wednesdays at 11 a.m. and, if there is enough interest (at least six participants), an on-line group will be held via zoom on Wednesdays at 7 p.m.

Each 90-minute session will include an opening, video segment, discussion, and a closing prayer. Although those wishing to participate do not need to purchase book, they are available from multiple sellers – including Amazon – in various formats for approximately \$17.50.

When I fall on my knees with my face to the rising sun, O Lord, have mercy on me.*



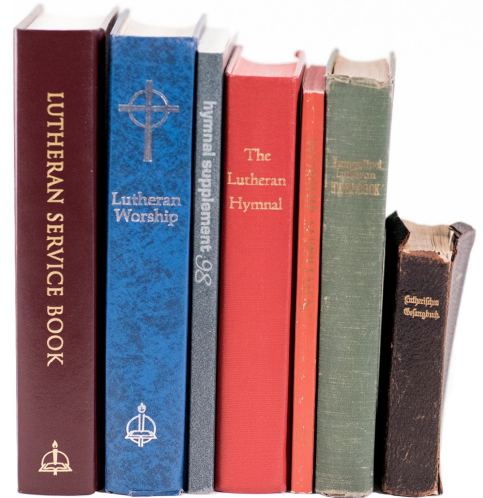
Some say that this spiritual was the password used to call slaves to secret, forbidden worship meetings in Virginia. Whether secret or not, the song calls Christians to gather and celebrate the Lord's Supper.

The posture is significant. Some

churches have participants kneel to take the elements of the sacrament, others have them sit or stand. Whatever posture the body takes, the attitude of the heart is worship. We come in reverence before our Lord, the host of this dinner party.

"The rising sun" could refer to an ancient custom of worshiping toward the east. Most cathedrals are built with the nave facing east, as if that is where God lives. God doesn't, of course, but the rising sun has often been a symbol for God. It brings new life and light, a source of energy and hope. Malachi prophesied that the "sun of righteousness will rise with healing in its wings" (Malachi 4:2), which many take as a reference to the coming Christ.

CPR / AED Training

Holy Trinity has scheduled a class on CPR/AED for staff, lay leaders, volunteers, and interested members. This free 3-hour course will be conducted by First Choice CPR from Canton, and will be held Monday, September 26, 2022, from 9:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. at Holy Trinity. A light lunch will be served following the class.

Information will be provided on the most current accepted practices for CPR and



the use of an AED. An AED, or automated external defibrillator, is used to help individuals experiencing

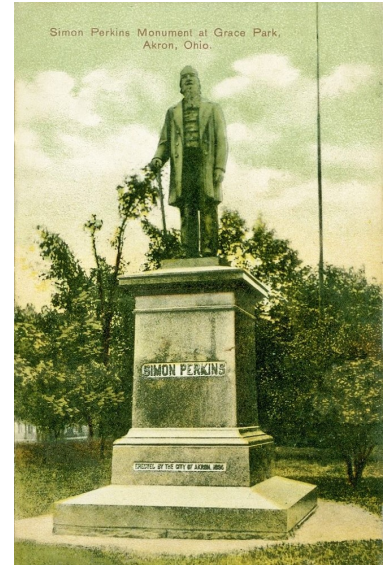
sudden cardiac arrest. This is a medical device that can analyze the heart's rhythm and, if necessary, deliver an electrical shock, or defibrillation, to help the heart re-establish an effective rhythm. Classes are taught by experienced clinical instructors who utilize a 1:1 student/manikin ratio for maximum hands-on practice and minimal "standing around time". Please wear comfortable clothing. This class is ODJFS approved, and each participant will receive ODJFS certification and a certification card following the course.

The class is being offered to adults, ages 18 and older. What's Been Missing from the Neighborhood?

Something has been missing from our neighbor across the street for quite a while. There is movement in the City of Akron to bring this 'something' back. What is it, you ask? The return of the statue of Simon Perkins, Jr. to Grace Park.

Grace Park, one of the oldest public parks in the City of Akron, is approximately seven acres in size. Prior to the property becoming a public park, the land was used for cattle grazing for the public, also known as a "public common." According to the Cleveland Plain Dealer (1900), the park was donated by Colonel Simon Perkins Jr. to the city of Akron in 1846, and by 1848 a fence had been erected around the park. The park is named after Simon Perkins' wife, Grace Tod Perkins. In 1895, a statue of Simon Perkins Jr.'s likeness was erected in his honor in the southwest corner of Grace Park. The statue



unveiling ceremony was "the largest parade ever held in Akron." By 1898 a pavilion stood in the center of the park in addition to a small fountain.

The park's location near Union depot made it prime real estate for political campaigns and "whistle stop" speeches. In 1916, Grace Park was the sending-off point of the Akronites who were heading off to fight in the First World War. The very same location would become the starting and ending point for several Memorial Day parades. Grace Park was the focal point of several community parades, including the Boy Scouts (1923) and pageants. Grace Park continued to serve as a hotbed of social gatherings in the 1920s, even during the Great Depression. In 1936, the May Day parade, which ended in Grace Park, had between 10,000 and 20,000 attendees from various labor unions.

Despite how Grace Park has changed over the past several decades, many folks strongly believe that the Simon Perkins statue should be returned to its rightful place ... back in Grace Park. The Summit County Historical Society is helping with this effort and seeks support from the community. If you would like to join this effort, please feel free to write/send letters to the Mayor and members of Akron City Council urging their support and/or passage of legislation relating to the return of the statue. DLM Food & Resources is Celebrating Five Years!!

WOW! Where has the time gone?! DLM Food & Resources opened its doors five years ago in October and has never looked back. It was created to meet a specific need and has transformed into so much more!

DLM is an outreach ministry of Holy Trinity Lutheran Church, Akron that provides individuals, children and families experiencing homelessness and hardships with food, clothing, and other vital resources. Through these efforts, we recognize the dignity of everyone, respect the challenges people face, and are open to the gifts everyone has to offer.

DLM is 'genuine people delivering heartfelt service.'

The DLM Food and Resources was inspired by the life and work of Debra L. Manteghi (1951-2017), a life-long member of Holy Trinity. For more than 20 years, Debra directed Project Rise, a program of Akron Public Schools for students experiencing homelessness. DLM Food and Resources is a collaborative project of Holy Trinity Lutheran Church, Project RISE, In One Piece Ministries, and other partners.

In the Beginning

After many months of planning, construction, cleaning, and organizing space within the church building, DLM Food & Resources opened its doors on October 17, 2017 as a two-room, food choice pantry to primarily serve the students and families involved with Project Rise. Families were welcomed and received snacks and drinks while they waited to shop for food. Word quickly spread throughout the community, and DLM began serving families from all over Summit County.

Today, DLM has expanded well beyond those two original rooms in order to provide families with what they need. Items such as meat, dairy and fresh produce; clothing and personal care items for adults, teens and children; and diapers and wipes for infants. All families are greeted and welcomed, treated with respect and shown love. And instead of snacks and drinks, everyone is able to enjoy a home-cooked meal while they wait to shop.

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Volunteers & Partners from Around NE Ohio

As with any new or growing ministry, you rely not only on your church members for help, but you seek the support of community partners and volunteers. And what a blessing it has been to see the partnerships grow and expand over these past five years!! Some of the current partners include Akron Public Schools, Project Rise, Shelter Care, Inc., SOS, The Highlands Pregnancy Center, Akron Canton Regional Food Bank, OhioGuidestone, Peter Maurin Center, OASIS, Project MKC, The Homeless Charity & Village, IBH Addiction Recovery Center & Reach, Hope Behavioral Health, Molina Health Care, Hudson High School, Faith Lutheran Church, Fairlawn, Cornerstone Market, Munroe Falls, Acme Fresh Markets, Dollar Tree and U-Haul.

COVID-19 & The DLM Box Experience

In 2020, the COVID-19 pandemic forced businesses, schools, churches ... just about everything to close, including DLM. But that didn't last long. DLM staff and its dedicated volunteers swiftly changed its processes from an in-person, food choice pantry to a food box delivery system. It was the only food pantry to do so in Summit County. Families in need were able to register to have a food box delivered to their home. Food boxes were prepared and delivered twice each month and included non-perishable items, fresh produce, dairy, and meat. In addition, personal care items and infant care boxes were also prepared and delivered as needed. Clothing was made available upon request.

Fast forward two years, and the DLM Box Experience is still going strong! In-person shopping has returned one weekend each month.

Who Has DLM Served?

The need for food, clothing, personal care items and community resources is increasing. Over the past five years, DLM Food & Resources has served families from 72 zip codes in 11 Ohio counties.

- 6,260 – the number of families served
- 22,632 – the number of individuals served
- 10,421 – the number of children served
- 1,881 – the number of seniors served
- 203,670 – the poundage of food provided to families

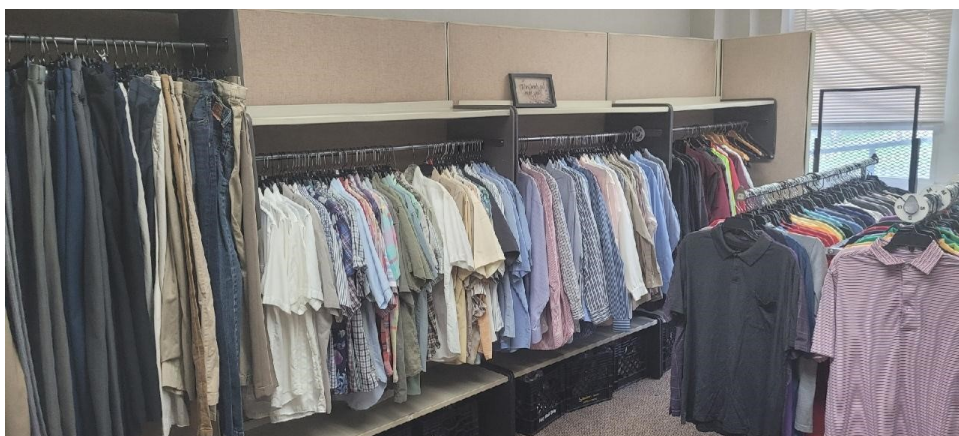
