




## Sunday, October 5, 4 p.m. Organ Plus

#### **★** Love Sacrificially

#### **★** Love Unconditionally

Jesus loved people before they ever "got it right." He loved Peter after the denial, the thief on the cross, and the woman caught in sin. We are called to love even when others don't meet our expectations.

#### \* Love with Grace and Truth

Jesus balanced grace and truth perfectly (John 1:14). We're called to speak truth lovingly—not to wound, but to restore. Grace makes truth bearable, and truth makes grace powerful.

#### **☆** Love the Least and the Lost

Jesus went after the outcasts, the poor, the sick, and the sinners. To love like Him means we don't play favorites. We reach out to those who are overlooked, hurting, or rejected.

#### \* Love Through Action

Love is more than words. "Let us not love with words or speech but with actions and in truth." -1 John 3:18 True love is expressed in serving, giving, listening, and showing up—even in small ways.

#### \* Love When It's Hard

Jesus loved through betrayal, rejection, and pain. To love like Him means choosing to forgive, stay patient, and keep loving—even when it's uncomfortable or inconvenient.

#### **★** A Lifestyle of Love

Loving others like Jesus isn't just something we do—it's who we become. When we live this way, people see Jesus in us. "By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you love one another." — John 13:35 †

Join us, following the service, for a festive reception of seasonal cookies and punch in the Chapel Lounge hosted by the Worship & Music Ministry Team.






#### Church Office Schedule During the Holidays

#### How Do We Faithfully Use the Time We've Been Given?

Time is one of life's most precious and limited resources. Every person, regardless of age, background, or wealth, is given the same 24 hours in a day. But how we choose to use those hours—how we steward the time we've been given—reveals our values, priorities, and understanding of purpose. Faithfully using our time doesn't mean constant busyness or rigid productivity. It means living intentionally, with wisdom, integrity, and an eternal perspective.

**1. Recognize That Time Is a Gift.** We often speak of "spending" time, but perhaps a better word is "investing." Time isn't something we own or can get back once it's gone. It's a gift—granted moment by moment. For people of faith, this gift comes from God, and with it comes the responsibility to steward it wisely.


Psalm 90:12 says, "Teach us to number our days, that we may gain a heart of wisdom." Recognizing the brevity of life helps us value each day, not in fear, but in faith. Every day holds potential for love, growth, service, and worship.

**2. Live With Purpose, Not Just Productivity.** In a culture that often equates worth with output, it's easy to get caught up in doing more rather than doing what matters. Faithful time management isn't just about full calendars and checked-off to-do lists. It's about aligning our daily actions with our deeper calling.

Ask yourself: What has God placed in front of me today? Where can I show love, offer help, or be present? Sometimes the most faithful use of time isn't crossing off tasks but stopping to listen to someone who needs you.

**3. Prioritize What Matters Most.** Time reveals what we truly value. If we say our relationships, health, or faith are important, but never make time for them, we're living out of sync with our convictions. Faithful time use calls us to reevaluate our priorities and adjust our schedules accordingly.

This may mean setting boundaries with work, saying "no" to certain commitments, or carving out space for rest and reflection. Jesus Himself often withdrew to quiet places to pray—reminding us that time spent in silence and solitude is not wasted, but essential.

Being present means giving full attention to the people and tasks before us. It means resisting distraction and embracing the sacredness of now.

Faithfulness isn't just about what we do in big moments—it's about how we show up in everyday ones. Washing dishes, sharing a meal, or taking a walk can all be holy acts when done with presence and gratitude.


#### 6. Let Eternal Perspective Shape Daily Choices.

Ultimately, faithfully using our time means living with eternity in view. What we do today echoes beyond the moment. A kind word, a selfless act, a time of prayer—these are seeds planted in time that bear fruit in eternity.

When we live for more than just ourselves or our comfort, we begin to see time not as something slipping away, but as something being redeemed.

#### Conclusion

To faithfully use the time we've been given is to live intentionally, love deeply, rest wisely, and act purposefully. It's not about doing everything—it's about doing the right things in the right spirit. Whether our days are long or few, the goal is the same: to live in such a way that when the time comes to look back, we see a life well-lived—not because we filled every moment, but because we were faithful in the moments we had. †





## **Loads of Love Laundry Ministry**

What a blessing the Loads of Love Laundry Ministry has been for families!

On the fourth Wednesday of each month, Holy Trinity is at Holland's 24-Hour Laundromat on S. Arlington Street in Akron, 5-7 p.m. and we pay for the washing and drying of people's clothing and bedding and provide the laundry supplies for those who need it.

Since launching this new ministry in May, we have paid \$3,227 to wash 732 single loads of laundry for more than 200 people. We have ministered to folks, we have prayed with them, and they have even prayed for us!

And, we have a following! There are several folks who come each month, because their month is more than the funds they have available, and our Loads of Love events help a lot. Here are a couple of stories showing the impact this ministry is making.

There was a mom (with her friend helping) who had to wash and dry every piece of clothing, all towels, and bedding for her family of 7 because of a fire in their home. That amounted to 15 large capacity washers that cost \$10.75 each plus the cost for the dryers. Everyone in her family is alright, and they are in the midst of finding housing. This mom shared with me that a friend told her about the Loads of Love Laundry event, and she began to cry. She had no idea how she was going to afford to wash and dry all their belongings.

There was another mom who heard about Loads of Love ... this was her first time coming. She continuously thanked us for hosting this event because it enabled her to wash and dry her children's clothing ... something she had not been able to afford to do for months. Her only option was to launder the clothes in the sink at home using a bar of soap.

We have met some wonderful people through this ministry ... people who we know by name and likewise, they know us. You are invited to come and serve at a Loads of Love Laundry Ministry event 5-7 p.m. at Holland's 24-Hour Laundromat ... there is a sign-up sheet at the Welcome Center. Come and share the love of Jesus with others ... it's an amazing experience! NOTE: The November and December events will be held a week earlier, November 19 and December 17. †






