Advent Waiting

When I was a child, the most difficult part of Christmas was simply waiting for it to come. Days seemed like weeks. Weeks felt like months. Time seemed to stand still.

Waiting has become strange to us. It seems unnatural. We demand instant gratification.

The signs of our unwillingness to wait are all around us. Fast food chains boom because we don't have time to cook. We would rather watch a movie than read the book. We complain when it takes more than a few second to connect to the internet.

Like most of you, I accept this no-wait approach to life, with the possible exception of instant potatoes, which, for the most part, I find intolerable. Although we do not like to wait, waiting is very much a part of life. We have to wait for an appointment with the doctor, a roast to cook, the mail to be delivered. And, when we head out to do our Christmas shopping, we had certainly better be prepared to wait in traffic, for a parking place anywhere near the door of the store, and in the check-out line.

There are also more serious things for which we have to wait. Some of us wait for a loved one to return, for the results of a biopsy, for our next paycheck. A scared child waits for morning. An expectant mother waits for delivery. A worried spouse waits for word that her husband's surgery was successful. Sometimes waiting can be pure agony.

Unfortunately, scripture suggests that God's clock is wound in a different way. God's perspective on time is different than ours. We look at days. God looks at centuries. Waiting, not hurrying, seems to be one of God's traits. And, this waiting God tells us that we, too, must wait.

This is where the Christmas story really begins. It begins thousands of years before the birth of Christ. It begins with people of faith waiting for God to send One who would bring light to the darkness, who would turn sorrow into joy. In the meantime, however, people of faith must wait.

The season of Advent is all about waiting. It is an awkward season, because we would prefer to skip the preliminaries and get right to the nativity. We would prefer to hear the words: "And there were shepherds, living out in the fields nearby, keeping watch over their flocks at night. An angel of the Lord appeared to them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them...." More than the "...Voice of one calling in the desert, 'Prepare the way for the Lord, make straight paths for him. Every valley shall be filled in, every mountain and hill made low. The crooked roads shall become straight, the rough ways smooth. And all humanity will see God's salvation.'" But the message of Advent is that we do not have permission to rush to the manger. The message is that for now, we must wait.

Even the hymns of Advent remind us of this: "Come, Thou Long-Expected Jesus," "People, Look East," "All Earth Is Waiting," "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel," We



The Hat & Scarf Christmas Tree is Back!




Organ Refurbishment Update



The Dawn Chorus: An Advent Devotional on the Wonders of Birds

In the wee hours of the morning, before the sun appears over the horizon, Songbirds begin a great symphony that scientists call the “dawn chorus.” Birds can sing at any time of day, of course, but in that deep blue space between darkness and light, their songs are louder, livelier, and passionately clear. Advent is the church’s dawn chorus. It starts in the silence, in the shadows, and looks to the light.

Each week, we gather together to listen and learn, proclaiming that in the end, the night will give way to the day; winter will give way to spring; despair to hope, war to peace, grief to joy, violence to love – and God will come again, like the morning star in the east!






Read to Me Day a Great Success!



Importance of Read to Me Day

Reading aloud to children stimulates language and cognitive skills and builds motivation, curiosity, and memory. Research shows that learning begins long before a child enters kindergarten and even infants soak up words, rhymes, songs and images. †

- **61%** of low-income children have no children’s books at home.
- Disadvantaged children hear as many as **30 million** fewer words than their more affluent peers.
- **By age 2** disadvantaged children are already behind their peers in listening, counting, and other skills essential to literacy.





long with anticipation. The day of fulfillment will come. That is a promise. But for now, we must wait.

There is a story about a woman who wanted peace in the world, peace in her family, and peace in her heart. Unfortunately everything was falling apart around her. One day she walked into a store and thought she recognized the cashier. "Excuse me," she said, "Are you Jesus?" "I am," he said. "You look exactly like you do in all the pictures I've seen of you," she replied. "Do you work here?" she asked. "I actually own the store," Jesus said. "What do you sell here?" she asked. "Just about everything," he replied. "Feel free to wander around, make a list of what you want, then come back and I'll see what I can do for you."

The woman did just that. She found an aisle completely devoted to peace: peace on earth, peace in families, peace in hearts." She returned with her list. Jesus looked it over, smiled, and said, "No problem." He walked away for a moment and returned with several small packets. "What are these?" the woman asked. "Seeds," Jesus answered. "You mean I don't actually walk out of here with peace on earth, peace in families, peace in my heart?" "No" he said. "This is a place of dreams. You come and see what it looks like and I give you the seeds. You go home and plant the seeds. You water them, nurture them, and help them grow. Someday someone else will reap the benefits." "Oh," she said, looking at him with a blank stare. And with that she walked out of the store without buying anything.

How will you wait for the birth of the Christ child this Advent season. Will it be with a blank stare or with anticipation, wanting to do everything you can to prepare? For now we must wait. But how we wait makes all the difference. †
