Back to ...

It's September. It's autumn...or will be soon. And that means it's also the season of expected cyclical transition from summer vacations to an academic calendar, from hot and humid to cooler and dryer, from baseball to football, from lush and green to chrysanthemums and colorful leaves. We are all, in some way or another, preparing to go back. But back to what?

Back to school, perhaps. What a joy it was yesterday to pack school supplies for our Robinson CLC teachers...to work alongside these folks with whom we have been partnered for a sixth season. It's has been (and continues to be) a ministry filled with great joy and significant impact for the school, the faculty, the students and their families. And perhaps that transition is happening in your household, too, as our own kids get ready for a first day of first grade...or high school...or law school. All the nerves. All the hopes. All the anticipation makes this a very special time.

But there is a heightened sense of anxiety as we go back to school in a lingering pandemic. To mask or not to mask? To vaccinate or not to vaccinate? To demonize those who oppose our point of view on these controversial subjects or to manage civil conversation even in disagreement? It seems as though going back to school...both this year and last...are a whole lot more difficult than we would like.

Back to church, too. Traditionally, the end of the summer season has meant a return to Sunday School, the reappearance of choirs in worship, and a new line-up of studies and fellowship events. There will indeed be something of the above that finds its way on to the Holy Trinity program calendar. But it's likely not to resemble the gatherings to which we were accustomed. Covid, again, has impacted our expectations for the usual. We will continue to rely on more innovative ways of gathering for worship and discipleship and the community-building fellowship we seek. And we will continue to sort out the science on how best to gather safely in person for those who are so inclined.

Back to normal? Well...that depends on your definition of normal. When I was ordained in 1994, normal meant that the internet was just being born. Amazon was busy selling books. Bill Clinton was in the White House. And there was no World Series because of a MLB players' strike. Social media had yet to be invented. Computers and cell phones were alarmingly (by today's standards) unsophisticated. The current context in which we do ministry could not even be imagined.

All of which means that our own life experience reminds us that we are continually growing, evolving, changing to meet the demands of our present moment...which is where, I think, the whole "back to" notion breaks down. We are never really going back to anything. We are always moving forward into what is becoming.

And that is good news.

As Christians, we know the future that is secured for us in the resurrection of Jesus. We can look ahead...and change with confidence...even amidst of tumult of our current situation because we know who holds the future, and consequently, who hold us.

So rather than "back to," let's focus on "into." We are being called "into" ministry "into" a future that we cannot clearly see, but one that we are confident is secure in the strong embrace of a gracious and loving God. And no matter what confronts us along the way, that God is with us and for us. We have that promise. We have one another. All of which, dear ones, is cause of joy and hope for whatever it is that we are moving "into" next. †



LES DÉLICES

DEBRA NAGY, DIRECTOR

SalonEra, the free early music-focused webseries from Les Délices, returns to streaming this September. The first three episodes of its highly-anticipated second season focus on three radically different facets of the classical music world. In September 13th's season opener, the Holy Trinity's Artists in Residence seek expressive new avenues in arias and chamber music by J.S. Bach. Episode 2 (premiering Sept. 27th) spotlights three performer-composers who are expanding the repertoire for period instruments while taking inspiration from historic compositional forms. October 18th's episode brings together a fabulous group of guest artists to explore the musical legacy of 17th century Mexican nun Sor Juana Inés de la Cruz, a visionary poet and intellectual.

Free from traditional programming and geographic constraints, the twelve episodes of SalonEra's 2021-22 season feature an eclectic range of subjects and an international cadre of illustrious artists and scholars. Audiences can expect accessible and engaging music and conversation across a wide range of fascinating topics. With a 50:50 ratio of newly-produced musical performances and enlightening conversation, each episode lasts around one hour, with an interactive Q&A following. SalonEra episodes are free to watch with a \$10 suggested donation. Episodes premiere concurrently on Les Délices YouTube Channel, Facebook page, and at SalonEra.org and are available in full for 48 hours following their premiere.

New this year, SalonEra Subscribers can support the entire 2021-2022 series and gain access to the 2020-21 archive of episodes with a one-time \$125 purchase. Subscriptions for SalonEra and for Les Délices' Concert Series will go on sale August 15th.



September 13: Bach & Beyond - The perennial appeal of Bach's music has inspired many artists across genres to adapt and arrange his music. SalonEra's Artists in Residence (including host Debra Nagy, keyboard maverick Eric Milnes, and viola da gambist Mélisande Corriveau) together with violinist Shelby Yamin, soprano Hannah De Priest, and special guest tenor Philippe Gagné pick up this trend as they turn violin sonatas into trios, trios into solos, imaginatively reconstruct new "Brandenburg" concertos, and even indulge in some Bach-inspired heavy metal.



September 27: Performer/Composers - Meet string-player Doug Balliett, harpsichordist Nicola Canzano, and baritone Jonathan Woody: three acclaimed performers whose multi-faceted careers include composing new music for early instruments. They'll share recent work as we explore their unique compositional viewpoints and creative processes. Nicola introduces the 18th-century compositional practice of Partimento, Doug follows Bach's legacy in composing a full year's worth of cantatas, and Jonathan previews his new work: By much love betray'd, commissioned for Les Délices' Concert

Stereo Review voted Newman's original instrument recording of Beethoven's Third Piano Concerto as "Record of the Year." Described by Wynton Marsalis as "The High Priest of Bach," and by Time Magazine as "The High Priest of the Harpsichord," Anthony Newman continues his 53-year career as America's leading organist, harpsichordist and Bach specialist. One of the fathers of the historically informed performance movement in the United States, the award-winning Newman is known for his passionate, virtuoso performances of the keyboard works of J.S. Bach. Since 1968, he has challenged the slow, unvarying, and reverential 19th century style of playing Bach's music and has helped restore the original energy to the Baroque repertoire.

A Program Focused on the ‘Hows’

At Holy Trinity, we believe in bringing Jesus to people through love and the word of God. It sounds like an amazing mission. Full of the promise of belonging, giving and purpose. But it's common in church missions, in life goals and in human thought to ask, "how?" How do we bring Jesus to people? How do we show that love? How do we use the word of God? We've found some of the how's in our outreach programs, in our small groups and in our worship, but it's time to go bigger and farther. With the evolution of online worship and virtual meetings, we have an opportunity to touch the world and we have the tools to do it.

Invite Welcome Connect is a program focused on the "hows." It breaks down bringing Jesus to people into inviting, welcoming and connecting others in the church, whether it's through an online space or in person. We've grown through the challenges of the pandemic and had an opportunity to connect with people worldwide on Sundays and in our weekly meetings. The way we interact as a church family and as human beings has changed. It will continue to evolve. Through need, we've continued to bring Jesus to people over the last year and a half. Using that growth and knowledge, we can now reach farther and connect with people where they are, even if it's not physically close. What an incredible opportunity.

Invite Welcome Connect is a toolkit that we can add to what we already know and already do. It gives concrete steps to empower everyone in the congregation to cultivate intentional practices of evangelism, hospitality and belonging. It opens up the doors of the church by bringing people in physically and by broadening our idea of where those "doors" can exist.

It starts at an individual level. People don't connect with a thing or a place the same way they connect with other people. We need people to be open to learning how to talk about their faith, how to answer hard questions, how to admit when they don't know and how to create space for genuine connection. We've done some of these things. We're great at some of these things. By bringing all of these things together and by having concrete tools and strategies, we can create a future of bringing Jesus to people, everywhere. We can shed limitations of physical space, we can know how to start the conversation and how to create a family who is constantly welcoming new members. †

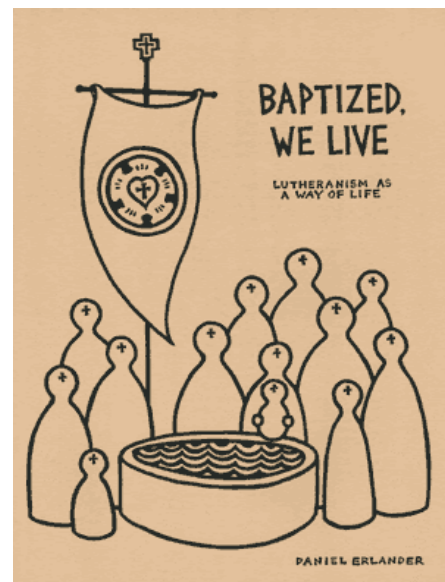

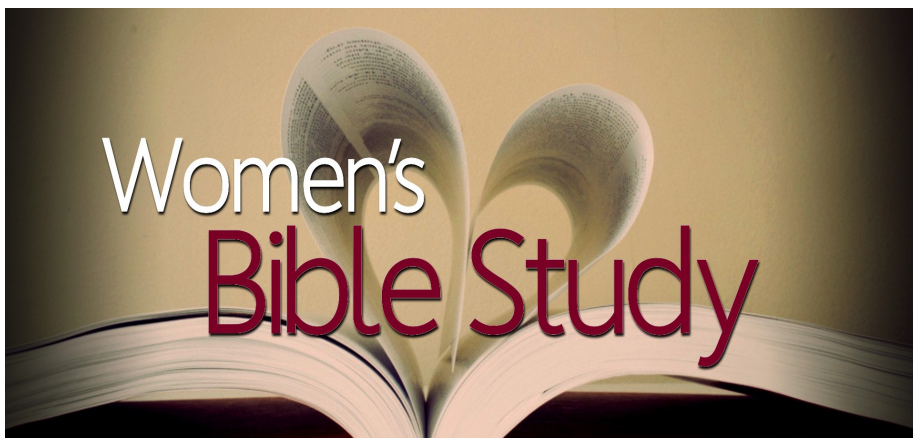

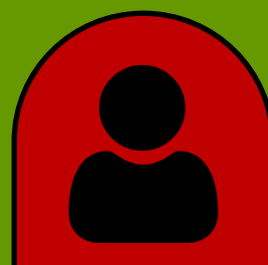
DLM by the Numbers




