



Our Neighbor Across the Street ... Part 2


Removing the Simon Perkins statue from Grace Park in 1999 seemed to deal a significant blow to the area. Against the will of the neighborhood, including Holy Trinity and Wesley Temple, the Akron City Council voted to remove the statue, refurbish it, and relocate it to the University of Akron campus. Like the park, the nine-foot bronze statue had lost its luster. It seemed one more sign that the city no longer cared about Grace Park.

However, instead of abandoning the park, both the City Council and the Akron Planning Director pledged to make long-term plans and significant improvements to the neglected park. The plan called for keeping it a “passive park,” meaning no trees would be cut down for other activities such as basketball courts or soccer fields. The city would refurbish the iron fence and add picnic tables, more lighting, a rubberized walking path, and play equipment.

The possible improvements did not keep Trinity and Wesley Temple pastors from protesting the move. Rev. Curtis T. Walker, the pastor of Wesley Temple, noted that if the city had cared about Grace Park all along, no one would be paying to move the statue. Rev. Byron Arledge, Trinity’s assistant pastor, watched the statue being taken out of the park on a rainy day and noted, “It was almost like the statue was crying for those of us in the area. We feel like we have lost a friend.”

Grace Park had more friends than just the two churches. Ethel Chambers was the founder of the Perkins Street Area Action Group, devoted to fighting crime and improving the neighborhood around Grace Park. As friend and neighbor Anne Lane Gates said, Ethel Chambers “was concerned about everything in the neighborhood and did everything she could to improve it . . . She was instrumental in revitalizing Grace Park.” She regularly attended City Council meetings and knew the right people to contact. “Everyone” knew Ethel Chambers and knew she would get things done.

Just before the statue’s removal, Mrs. Chambers and Anne Gates started an annual neighborhood picnic in Grace Park. The goal was to restore pride in the community and help local residents. Yolanda Parker of Open Door Assembly of God eventually joined the

group. By 2013, 1200 people attended the event. Supporters included Holy Trinity. Attendees received school supplies, clothes, food, and household items. Information on health care and community services was available also.

While Grace Park still has its problems, the 2000s have increased the park's use. The University Park Development Corporation organized art fairs in the summer, which drew people from all over the area. Other organizations have been a presence and/or created events in the park, including Snow Angels with Christmas in July to help the area's homeless. For years, Holy Trinity gardeners helped maintain the garden around the flagpole and two others at Park and Prospect. LUMA had worship services, and Trinity recently hosted the Kelly Glow concert.

What is the future of our neighbor to the east? No one knows for sure, but Grace Park is on the radar. The 2018 Downtown Akron Vision and Redevelopment Plan noted that Grace Park and the surrounding area had "residential opportunity." One stakeholder commented in the report that "Grace Park is a wonderful urban park but an underutilized amenity." The neighbors would agree. †







The LINKS Academy is a program of LINKS Community & Family Services, an outreach ministry of Open Door Church. The LINKS Academy is an after-school program that serves up to 30 students who attend Robinson and Mason CLCs. They meet each weekday after school, Monday through Thursday, 2:30-4:30 p.m. Holy Trinity has served as the site for the LINKS Academy since it began.

When the students arrive, they gather in the Fellowship Hall for a snack and some free time. Everyone then moves to their new classrooms on the 3rd floor and divide into groups by grade. They spend 15-20 minutes reading to themselves or being read to by volunteers followed by 30 minutes of doing school work. Tutors are available to help. At 4 p.m., the students come together for the special and fun activity of the day, which range from art, nutrition to outdoor play. They end their afternoon with a meal.

There is always a need for more volunteers and donations ... here's how you can help!

- **Help prepare the snacks and meal.** Cooks and those who like to help prepare meals are needed. Volunteers are asked to arrive at 2:30 p.m. to help with prep work.

It is a privilege to worship, to serve, and to give of ourselves as we share God's Good News with our neighbors and friends. We do that as individuals by the choices we make in everyday life. Velma Pomrenke—Candidate for Nominating Committee





Communion Bread Recipe

Ingredients:

- 1½ cups whole wheat flour
- ½ cup regular white or bread flour
- ¾ teaspoon baking soda
- 3 tablespoons butter (*unsalted is best; may substitute margarine*)
- ¾ cup warm water
- 3 tablespoons honey
- ¾ teaspoon salt
- Combine the water and honey. Stir this into the flour/butter mixture, and combine until you have a sticky dough.
- Turn out onto a board/counter, adding flour until you can knead it. Knead until smooth.
- Divide the flour into four equal parts. Roll or press each part into a 6" flat circle.
- Lightly score a cross into the top of each circle. Brush with vegetable oil. Place onto a lightly-greased baking sheet.
- Bake at 350 for no more than 12 minutes. (Over baking makes the bread crumbly.)

Directions:

- Combine the first four ingredients well. Cut in the butter, and work in thoroughly.
- Remove and allow to cool completely.
- When cool it can be bagged for use later in the week or bagged and frozen for use up to three weeks later.


