Attendance in school is vital to a child's learning. Holy Trinity has been meeting with the teachers and staff at Robinson CLC to discuss ways to help support and encourage school attendance.

## This Public Space *By Pastor David Nevergall*



It's generally about 4:30 p.m. when the noise level increases. A door swings open, and the laughter and shouting of children explodes up from the play yard just below my study window, joyful (for the most part) and rambunctious. It's one of my favorite times of the day, and may well be one of the most important things that happens in this building on a regular basis. The LINKS students are back, along with the loving folks from Open Door Assembly and Holy Trinity who care for them. But really...how is it that play time is one of the most important things that happens here? After all, we have worship which I would argue is the most central act of our Christian community. But we also have

important meetings about all manner of church issues. We have classes and study groups. Councils and cabinets. Teams and committees. Budgets and procedures and history, oh my. And somehow a rowdy group of elementary students is key to what it means to be in this place at this time?

Perhaps it's because they remind us why we're here at all. And perhaps they are a glimpse in our day at the future of the church.

Some background: In the early 4<sup>th</sup> century, Emperor Constantine made Christianity the religion of the empire. The rationale for that and its consequences are subject for another conversation. What I'd like us to consider for this moment is that the newly-legitimized church needed places to accommodate the crowds. No longer consigned to private homes and small gatherings, the Church needed space. And it found that space in the Roman basilica, a type of building which originated in ancient Rome. Centuries before "basilica" became a churchy word, it denoted the public space where courts were held and where other official and public functions were conducted. The basilica was centrally located in every Roman town, usually adjacent to the main forum. As the Roman Empire adopted Christianity, the major church buildings were typically constructed with this style and thus it became popular throughout Europe. But it was always and foremost a public space for the community.

For a variety of reasons, that notion of being public space waned over the years. In some places, the church became a fortress keeping a hostile world at bay. In other places, the church became a club house focused on meeting the needs and catering to the desires of its members. In still other places, the church found it easier and more convenient to simply become the empire's religious wing or to give way to secular culture. But the call to be open and engaged with the community around it for the sake of Christ has never (to my knowledge) been rescinded. So the delightful chaos that ascends from the play yard to my windows comes as a welcome reminder of who and what we are yet called to be. It occurs to me that as a congregation we already know this and take it seriously. Good.

Now, let's make sure that the knowledge of that call is part of our conversation over the next several months. As directed by Council and led by

One of the five promises we make in the Affirmation of Baptism is "to serve all people, following the example of Jesus." Jesus' example, whether it is in his stories, his healing acts, his act of footwashing, or his primary expression of love on the cross all share a common core. Jesus uses his power, in fact gives up his power, to the benefit of others. This is service. Intentionally doing work that shares our power, our resources, our time, our abilities and skills for the building up of others, so that hopefully they too may glimpse that they are valued and come to trust in the One who loves them without fail.

For some, you live this out in your profession, for others the loved ones in your care demand more of your energy at this time, for some you have the energy and time to work to strengthen the mission of the church or offer hope to the vulnerable in our communities. As you examine your faithful use of the resources and opportunities God is giving you, you might ask, "Am I using my time and abilities to my own benefit or the benefit of others? How is what I'm doing pointing others to Jesus?" Even if you are not in a place to make a big change in your priorities, look for small things that you can give up, so that you might be freed to bless others with a new opportunity to serve. In doing so, you just might discover a new avenue for hope and joy in your life. †





## Frequently Asked Questions About this New Outreach Ministry

*Holy Trinity is excited about this new ministry. But exactly what is it? Why this type of outreach project? Who will it serve? Below are the answers to these and many of the other most asked questions.*

### What is DLM Food and Resources?

DLM Food and Resources is a joint project of Holy Trinity Lutheran Church and Akron Public Schools' Project RISE. It serves homeless students and their families primarily by providing food (a need identified by Project RISE), as well as access to other helpful information. It is offered in memory of Debra Lynn Manteghi.

### Who is Debra Manteghi?

Debra Manteghi was a Holy Trinity member who was a well-respected presence in the city of Akron and an advocate for homeless families in the community. She started Akron Public Schools' Project RISE over 20 years ago. She recently passed away and this project was born through relationships formed during her end of life care. The name "Dare to Love More" comes from her initials D.L.M. and honors her challenge to care and advocate for those on the margins.

### What is Project RISE?

Project RISE (Realizing Individual Strength through Education) is a federally-funded, collaborative effort of Akron Public Schools, local shelters and the community to provide supplemental educational services to children and youth who are experiencing homelessness.

### Why a food pantry?

Food security was a need that Project RISE identified as lacking for their client families. Debra was a long-time member of Holy Trinity, and there is energy and room to help meet this need here.

### Who is responsible for what aspects of this project?

A joint planning committee is steering the project. That committee includes representatives from Holy Trinity, Project RISE, and In One Piece Ministries (a ministry to the homeless in Grace Park). Additionally, Holy Trinity is providing the space (Room 100) and volunteers. Project RISE provides support in terms of manpower and grant funding for the food purchases. In One Piece is providing volunteer support and resources.

### Where does DLM fit among the ministries at Holy Trinity?

Although DLM has its own planning and management team,

this project falls under Holy Trinity's Outreach and Social Concerns Ministry.

### Where will the food come from?

We expect that most of the food will be purchased at a highly discounted rate from the Akron-Canton Regional Food Bank. Some free food items are also available from the food bank. Additional food will come from food donations. In addition to the typical food drive, we are exploring a program at Panera Bread that donates day-old goods to community food pantries. Several other food retailers and restaurants offer similar opportunities.

### Where will volunteers come from?

Volunteers will come from Holy Trinity, from Project Rise and the Akron Public School system, from In One Piece Ministries, and from other area churches (several of whom have already contacted us about being involved).

### Whom will DLM serve?

At the outset, we will serve Project Rise families by referral from that program. As additional resources (funds for food, volunteers, etc.) become available, the goal is to open to the public once a month.

### How will the food be given out?

The food is client choice so they can select based on their family size and preferences. We will also be looking at ways to get the clients involved in part of the process in the future. As part of our Mission at Work initiative and through training such as Bridges out of Poverty (and Reimagining Charity), it's important to give a "hand up" and not a "hand out."

### Where will the room be located?

At Holy Trinity in Room 100. The space is currently being renovated for its new purpose.

### When will DLM open?

Beginning in October 2017, the DLM Food & Resources Room will be open two Saturdays each month, 10 a.m.-12 p.m. Initially, it will be open for families referred by Project RISE. The plan is to eventually open the space other days

throughout the month for families whose children are involved with the LINKS Academy, whose children attend Robinson CLC and those who frequent Grace Park.

**Is there a budget for this project?**

Yes, there is a budget with funds from memorial gifts received in Debra's memory and Holy Trinity's Mission Initiative Fund. In addition, an ELCA Domestic Hunger Program Grant has been applied for, and other grants will be sought.

**I'd like to help. How can Holy Trinity members get involved in this project?**

Deacon Marla Wood Kay in conjunction with the DLM planning team is working on setting up volunteer teams. Contact her ([mwkay@holyltrinityakron.org](mailto:mwkay@holyltrinityakron.org)) if you would like to:

- Work on the planning and management committee.
- Form your own volunteer team. This would be a great family project or an opportunity to try something new with a group of friends. Such volunteer groups could serve twice a year, quarterly or more as the group desires. Training will be provided.
- Enlist as a single volunteer, and be placed on a team. We will need drivers to pick up food orders, stock shelves, and persons to welcome and guide guests to make food selections on open pantry days. Training will be provided. †

## A Look at the Numbers

It is a privilege to worship, to serve, and to give of ourselves as we share God's Good News with our neighbors and friends. We do that as individuals by the choices we make in everyday life. And we do that together by our work as a congregation. That's what good stewardship is all about.

For that reason, we monitor statistics on attendance and giving to the church. They offer a glimpse into the health of our congregation. Through the first thirty-five weeks of the year, average weekly worship attendance at Holy Trinity (Sunday morning and midweek services) was 171.8. That's up from an average of 157.6 per week during the same period last year...**an increase of 9%**. Worship is fundamental to the strength of the community and mission we share. Thanks for making it a priority in your life.


Through the first eight months of the year, our undesignated giving in support of Holy Trinity's ministry was \$281,749. Our budget estimate for that same period was \$243,816. **That's 15.6% better than we had expected.** Total income year to date was \$428,776, or about 110% of what we had hoped to achieve. Total expenditures were \$410,077. Thank you for your attention to your own giving habits. We continue to be blessed by your generosity. # Communion Bread Recipe


## Ingredients:

- 1½ cups whole wheat flour
- ½ cup regular white or bread flour
- ¾ teaspoon baking soda
- 3 tablespoons butter  
*(unsalted is best; may substitute margarine)*
- ¾ cup warm water
- 3 tablespoons honey
- ¾ teaspoon salt

## Directions:

- Combine the first four ingredients well. Cut in the butter, and work in thoroughly.

- Combine the water and honey. Stir this into the flour/butter mixture, and combine until you have a sticky dough.
- Turn out onto a board/counter, adding flour until you can knead it. Knead until smooth.
- Divide the flour into four equal parts. Roll or press each part into a 6" flat circle.
- Lightly score a cross into the top of each circle. Brush with vegetable oil. Place onto a lightly-greased baking sheet.
- Bake at 350 for no more than 12 minutes. (Over baking makes the bread crumbly.)
- Remove and allow to cool completely.
- When cool it can be bagged for use later in the week or bagged and frozen for use up to three weeks later.

the Renaissance Committee, we will be talking about the use and purposes of our building here at the corner of Park and Prospect. We'll be considering how this space supports our ministries, and how it might be better suited to that task. And, having done all that, we will make some decisions about how best to steward the good gift of place and structure that we have been given by God. And I wonder: Might it be that we are once again called to fully reclaim the idea of basilica? Could we be that space where the community gathers not only for worship, but for learning and sometimes hard conversation and shared work that advance the public good? It's exciting to consider what that might mean for us and for the future of Holy Trinity.

Through it all, we serve and worship the God who has reconciled creation in Christ Jesus. May the Spirit of our risen Lord continue guide us as we consider this public space. †
