REVERSE ADVENT:

A Spiritual Discipline of Reaching Out

Throughout the Advent season, we will be collecting items and money to be distributed to Mission partners in our community. Members and friends are asked to collect the following during the week and bring their donations on Sunday morning.

Week 1 (December 3rd) - What food would the Holy Family need for their journey to Bethlehem?

- Place non-perishable FOOD ITMES in a bag for those living with food insecurity served by the DLM Food & Resources Center.
- Talk about the role of food in your own life. Pray for the families in our community who are living with food insecurity.

Week 2 (December 10th) - What did the Holy Family need for warmth?

- Place WARM CLOTHES (hats, gloves, scarves, socks) in a bag for the Robinson CLC Clothes Closest.
- Talk about the clothes you wear to stay warm in the winter. Pray for those who have little or no shelter from the cold.

Week 3 (December 17th) – How would the Holy Family care for themselves?

Place BASIC TOILETRIES (toothpaste, toothbrush, deodorant, soap, shampoo, comb, nail clippers, etc.) in a bag for the Housing insecure served by OPEN M, Haven of Rest, and Center for Hope & Healing.

If Anyone Should be on a Ladder, It's Jesus



I'm not really great with heights to begin with. They've always made me a bit queasy. But <u>somebody</u> needed to climb the ladder, and <u>somebody</u> needed to put the lights and decorations on the top of the tree that would grace the chancel of St. Mark's Lutheran Church in Columbus. And who better to do it than the eager-to-provehimself, first-year seminary student who was considerably younger than most of the crowd that showed up to help decorate.

Have I mentioned that I'm not really great with heights? I'm also not that great with balance either apparently. So all it took was a reach just a bit too far away from my extended center of gravity, and the ladder moved...in the opposite

direction. And I tumbled into the tree and onto the chancel floor. There were plenty of oohs and aahs, but no cuts or bruises...except the ones to my ego.

That experience has stayed with me through the years, but I tend to process it less in terms of embarrassment now and more as a clue to our theological understanding. Those who attended this summer's "Lutheran Basics" class will recognize the paradigm. As Dr. Wengert explained to us: a lot of religion is built upon the notion that we need to do something to get into heaven (or whatever you label right relationship with God). "We are climbing Jacob's Ladder" isn't just an old song; it's a way of taking charge of our own salvation. We want to get right with whatever divine power controls our destiny. And we do that by working hard to prove ourselves like that young, first-year seminary student. And we will be good, and we will be noticed for being good...by those around us and by God.

"Up Religion" is the label Dr. Wengert put on it. And it's a great theory except for the fact that it doesn't work. We climb and climb and eventually lose our balance and tumble back to earth humiliated. We keep on trying and keep on failing...usually until apathy or despair sets in.

But Christianity is not an "Up Religion." It's a "Down Religion." And we see that clearly in the Advent and Christmas celebrations just ahead of us. God takes on human form and comes to us...meeting us as we are and where we are to demonstrate once and for all who we are...beloved children of a gracious God whose actions make possible the divine/human connection we celebrate as eternal life.

If anyone should be on a ladder, it's Jesus. And the tremendously good news? Jesus <u>is</u> on the ladder. In Christ, God does for us what we cannot accomplish on our own, no matter how hard we try or how brave and eager we are. We have been set right with God by God's own grace. All the work that needs to be done comes after that fact. With gratitude for the best gift we'll ever receive (at Christmas or any other time), we can get busy in the world around us...sharing ourselves and the good things we bear with those who need the good news we have received.

"And the Word became flesh, and dwelt among us." Right there it is in the first chapter of John's Gospel. Sisters and brothers, put that ladder away (or, at least, the urge to climb) before you hurt yourself. God is the one who climbs down for you and all this waiting, hurting world. O come, let us adore him. +

These are not life changing events, but they are small opportunities to bridge divides between people that need each other. Between communities that need each other. It's a joy to come together and serve the community. +

Read about a Favorite Holy Trinity Christmas Hymn

Angels from the realms of glory, Wing your flight o'er all the earth; Ye who sang creation's story Now proclaim Messiah's birth:

(Refrain) Come and worship, come and worship, Worship Christ, the newborn King.

Shepherds, in the field abiding,
Watching o'er your flocks by night,
God with us is now residing;
Yonder shines the infant light: (Refrain)

Sages, leave your contemplations, Brighter visions beam afar; Seek the great Desire of nations; Ye have seen His natal star: (Refrain)

Saints, before the altar bending, Watching long in hope and fear; Suddenly the Lord, descending, In His temple shall appear: (Refrain)



Text writer James Montgomery (1771-1854), a newspaperman in London, served time in prison – twice – for his controversial editorials. This poem ran in his column on Christmas Eve, 1816, without complaint.

Montgomery contributed a great deal to the development of Christian hymns.

He championed the cause of the poor and downtrodden, as well as foreign missions. In writing this hymn, Montgomery referred not only to the Gospel accounts of Christ's birth, but also to the messianic prophecies of the Old Testament, where the Messiah is called the desired of all nations (Haggai 2:7), who would come suddenly to His temple (Malachi 3:1).

We sing this hymn to music composed by a blind organist, Henry Smart (1813-1879). An outstanding musician of his day, Smart designed and built some of England's finest organs. +





A Look at the Numbers

It is a privilege to worship, serve, and give of ourselves as we share God's Good News with others. We do that as individuals by the choices we make in everyday life. And we do that together by our work as a congregation. That's what good stewardship is all about.

For that reason, we monitor statistics on attendance and giving to the church. They offer a glimpse into the health of our congregation. Through the first forty four weeks of the year, average weekly worship attendance at Holy Trinity (Sunday morning and midweek services) was 172. That's up from an average of 159 per week during the same period last year... an increase of a bit more than 8%. Worship is fundamental to the strength of the community and mission we share. Thanks for making it a priority in your life.

Through the first nine months of the year, our undesignated giving in support of Holy Trinity's ministry was \$360,969. Our budget estimate for that same period was \$303,968. That's 18.8% better than we had expected. Total income year to date was \$544,973, or about 112% of what we had hoped to achieve. Total expenditures were \$520,103. Thank you for your attention to your own giving habits. We continue to be blessed by your generosity. We encourage you to continue that generosity into the new year. There will be an opportunity during Lent to learn more about giving as a spiritual discipline and to assess your own habits. In the meantime, we ask you to prayerfully consider your ongoing support for the work we share. Thank you for being intentional in what you give.

More and more folks are moving to electronic giving means, and we have the ability to accommodate that, too. Many find that it is an especially convenient way to manage financial stewardship. Contact Rick Kimble, our financial secretary, for more information about available options and/or to set it up. Please remember: Your tithes and other gifts not only pay the day to day bills here. They extend God's love and grace through our mission work in this area and well beyond.

Your faithful participation by means of worship, work and support bear witness to the significance of Christ's place in your life. It says to others that what you believe is important enough to affect the way you live. **Thank you** for being good stewards of the gifts with which God has equipped you. And remember to join us...this and every week...as the work of Christ's Church goes on. †

Communion Bread Recipe

Ingredients:

- 1½ cups whole wheat flour
- ½ cup regular white or bread flour
- ¾ teaspoon baking soda
- 3 tablespoons butter (unsalted is best; may substitute margarine)
- 3/4 cup warm water
- 3 tablespoons honey
- 3/4 teaspoon salt

Directions:

• Combine the first four ingredients well. Cut in the butter, and work in thoroughly.

- Combine the water and honey. Stir this into the flour/butter mixture, and combine until you have a sticky dough.
- Turn out onto a board/counter, adding flour until you can knead it. Knead until smooth.
- Divide the flour into four equal parts. Roll or press each part into a 6" flat circle.
- Lightly score a cross into the top of each circle. Brush with vegetable oil. Place onto a lightly-greased baking sheet.
- Bake at 350 for no more than 12 minutes. (Over baking makes the bread crumbly.)
- Remove and allow to cool completely.
- When cool it can be bagged for use later in the week or bagged and frozen for use up to three weeks later.
